others who even now were making their way up to the altar. In those moments my heart was strangely warmed. Deep emotion was rising in me, yet at the same time I was aware of an interior struggle taking place. I knew that I had something important but difficult to do.

Inside me a light was dawning, and it took the form of this strange thought: While I knew I had given myself to Jesus, I knew also that I had never really given myself to people. Something in me had always held back, guarded, insecure, stilted, untrusting. Whereas Jesus seemed approachable because He offered unconditional love, people were a mixed bag. In many ways I had learned to let go and let God, but with people I could never quite let myself go. Accordingly, while my faith was ever so spiritual, 1 was lacking in simple human warmth.

Years before I had come close to entering a monastery, only to fall in love and get married instead. But marriage, too, to my great surprise, had turned into a rather comfy sort of monastery, a place where I could hide from my sense of social inadequacy. Now I felt the Lord calling me to come out of my monk's cell, to walk forward into the arms of my inadequacy, and to give myself to people. Moreover, it was time to stand up and make a public commitment to this effect, just as I had stood at the altar with Karen and publicly exchanged wedding vows.

So I answered this call. That day, along with all those who went forward to give their lives to Jesus, I rose before the assembly and gave myself to the people ... For me this was a tremendous and mysterious step. I could not know all that it meant, nor did I feel any special strength to carry it out. But I'd been running from people all my life, and it was time to turn around and walk the other way. Having invited Jesus into my heart, it was time now to invite people in. For the conviction had overwhelmed me that this is what it means to be a Christian.
